



Our little group consisted of Mike Reese, his son Michael; pop gave his son the trip for his graduation from high school. Most of us give our kids a watch or some other ridiculous item for graduating. Not Mike he gave his son a life lasting gift, he will never forget this trip, Duane Dudley and I, there were four of us. We had two guides, one at the front of our expedition, Henry Krenka and Danny Riddle brought up the rear. Danny works for Henry as a sub-guide and was given the job of keeping an eye on four green horns, making sure we did not get lost.

We arrived at the Riddles ranch in the Ruby valley eagerly awaiting the fishing trip. Talk about a cool place in the world, they, Vickie and Danny decided to escape and live in rural Nevada and they did. It is about 65 miles southeast of Elko their closest neighbor is about a mile down the road. When you pass someone on the road they wave and say hi, pretty cool.

We got up early Monday morning had breakfast loaded the mules and headed down the road to Henrys ranch. There we picked up Henry and all his horses and headed for Lamoille Canyon. We spent the first day getting there; getting unpacked the tents up and preparing for our stay. They all got back on the horses went to one of the lakes and went fishing; I stayed in camp with a good book and a nap, it is a bitch getting old. When they returned Danny fixed dinner, a meal fit for a king, it was a superb meal. Went to bed, slept like a baby, got up and went fishing, floated on a lake in a float tube. Photon Freedom Micro Lights

A word followed by the word "poor" refers to one's wealth tied up in that particular product; i.e. "gun poor" would mean having lots of guns and not much else. We know the kind: lots of holsters, camera bags, knives, dogs, etc.

Well, that's me. I am flashlight poor. It all started with that silver Raovac, that was solid rubber coated (which replaced the one that didn't bounce or hold up in a light drizzle; or for that matter a second hunting season).



My collection evolved into the 3 or 4 cell Kel or Mag Light (often a very adequate alternative to a police officer's baton), then to the rechargeable Streamlight who's beam was significantly brighter, but so often seemed to die exactly when you needed it the most. Today I have a handful of Streamlights and Browning flashlights that use the reliable but expensive 123 batteries. ¼ the size and has as much or more beam than the old Mag Lights.

I've recently added the **Photon Freedom Micro Lights** to my stable of personal illuminators. They were initially designed as key ring lights, but are so much more valuable. I not only have one on my key chain, but on the front door exit key, in my truck, ATV key ring, on my night stand, and even on my bow. They come in several colors that can be seen a mile away. Red is great for getting to the blind, or reading a map in the dark (USMC family proven) without destroying any night vision. Some models you hold on, some can be locked on, and some have adjustable brightness. They come with lanyards, finger straps, handlebar brackets, magnets, or clips that can be attached to a hat brim or work station – hands free!

The good thing is a incredibly bright bean that rivals the big expensive flashlights, and the battery lasts a very long time and is easy to find and replace. Oh ya: Under \$20.00!
