The ice has been off since late January and the fishing reports have been good so its time for another one of our Angler of the Year events. The old timers call these small chain of lakes Sunnyside but the official name is Wayne Kirch Wildlife Management Area. Sunnyside is 175 miles north of Las Vegas take I-15 north 20 miles to highway 93 exit toward Ely follow 93 just past Ash Springs to highway 318 north go roughly 70 miles and look for the signs for to the Management Area, Haymeadow lake is roughly 8 miles down a good dirt road. We will be fishing one of the lower lakes called Haymeadow, again follow the signs. Some may wish to go up Friday night and camp at the small camp ground or go up early on Saturday morning. The fishing is set to start at 9am until 2pm for the Angler of the Year

honors. Bring a lunch and a chair. Small boats, canoes or float tubes are the best bet as 90% of the banks are choked with cattails and unfishable from shore, only the dam is accessible to shore fishing. Check NDOW fishing regulations for approved tackle, many of us will be fly fishing but worm dunking is allowed (is

that really fishing?). I will be fishing the lake March 6th to confirm the fishing conditions.

#### The Alamo By Rick Ainsworth

On March 6, 1836 in a small mission in Southwestern Texas called the Alamo, a small band of 200 freedom fighters, led by Jim Bowie, Davy Crockett and William B. Travis were overwhelmed by a Mexican army force of over 1500 men, led by General Antonio Lopez Santa Anna. All the Alamo defenders were either killed in the battle or executed after capture. What compelled this small band of soldiers, adventurers, explorers, trappers and idealists to stand and fight against an overwhelming force with no chance of survival?

They were there to fight for the right of Texans to break away from Mexico and form their own republic. The freedom fighters were an eclectic assortment of people. 13 were native Texan, with 11 of those being of Mexican descent. 41 men were born in Europe, 2 were Jews, two were blacks and the rest were Americans from various states and backgrounds, come to Texas to fight for freedom. Mexico had fought and successfully separated itself from Spain, and the Texians (as they were known) wanted to pursue the same course for independence.

From Tennessee came legendary frontiersman Davy Crockett, who had proclaimed to his constituents in his last Congressional election, "…if you choose to re-elect me I will serve as before. If not, you may all go to hell and I will go to Texas." He lost the election, and true to his word, he went to Texas and to the Alamo and died for an ideal on March 6, 1836. From Kentucky, via Louisiana, came pioneer, soldier and smuggler, Jim Bowie, who had already built a reputation as a fighter with the Texas Militia. He commanded the forces at the Alamo until he fell ill. He arrived at the Alamo to fight for an ideal. It is said he died in his sick bed, his empty pistols still in his hands, on March 6, 1836.

From the ranks of the recently formed Texan army came newly commissioned Lieutenant Colonel William B. Travis, under orders to relieve the defenders of the Alamo. As the Mexican army began probing the Alamo defenses, Colonel Travis wrote a letter addressed to, "...the people of Texas and all Americans across the world." He beseeched the army to send more men and supplies, stressing that his force of less than 200 was facing a Mexican force of over 1000. His letter survived the siege and became an icon of the Texas revolution. Travis never got the relief he sought, and died for an ideal on March 6, 1836.

During the worst of the Mexican siege, Travis drew a line in the sand and asked all who would stay and fight to step over the line. All but one did. Facing certain death and sure to be overrun, all but one stepped over the line. The fall of the Alamo and the death of its defenders did not happen in vain. In death they succeeded in accomplishing something they could not in life: they became martyrs to the cause, and the Alamo a rallying cry for Texas independence. Because of the ultimate sacrifice of these men and so many others, Texas became a republic and would remain an independent republic until 1846 when it joined the Union.

American history is replete with such stories of idealism, faith, commitment and heroism. Indeed, they are a part of our heritage, our traditions, our very souls. Americans are idealists and always will be. We will not be pushed around by authority. It is time to draw another line in the sand. We are being manipulated by an out of control behemoth of a central government which is seizing more and more power over us daily. From what toilets we can buy to what light bulbs we can use to how big a cola we can purchase, the government wants to control every aspect of our lives.

Now they want our guns.

They cannot have them. The Second Amendment says so.

They will come after our magazines and bullets first, and then, as sure as letting the camel's nose poke under the tent, we will soon find ourselves in bed with a camel. The line is drawn, it is time to take the step. It is time to stand and fight for freedom. Who will step over that line?

Remember the Alamo!
