## Is A Big Game Hunt A Success Without A Gut Pile? by Ralph Willits

There are numerous reasons we hunt. It's been debated extensively for most of the last century. Careers have been made just talking about the topic. Few can deny however that it has been part of our being since the dawn of time. If you didn't hunt or live off of the successes of those who did, you died. Today, to query the reasons we hunt can spur a variety of responses, just from the hunters.

I don't have a bunch of heads on the wall or meat in the freezer. I hunt because I cherish the outdoors and the challenges that come with it. No, not a camp spot on Mt. Charleston, but the real Nevada backroads. No pavement, no neon, no cell phones, no Ferguson.

When I have a tag, it forces me to get out and do what it takes to bring home some healthy God made nutrition for me and my family. Too often, countless excuses keep us in the city when only a tag in hand allows us a guilt free trek into the wilderness. But if I never drop the hammer or knock an arrow. I still find it a success.

Earlier this year, as has been customary since my first application applying on my own, I began to research what, when, how, and especially where. I grew up in Reno and know some pretty favorable Northern locals to bring home some freezer filler from dove and turkey, to deer and antelope. Southern Nevada: If it doesn't have curled horns – I'm out of the loop.



Enter Las Vegas Woods and Waters. I joined 3 years ago after the archery shoot at Sportsman's Warehouse. My family and I were welcomed with open arms. Thank you Woods and Waters for finding me. I realized in this concrete infused metropolis that LVWW is one place that I don't have to justify or defend what I do. It is also a place where a great bunch of my now friends are more than willing to help one another find that next spot to fill a creel or game bag.

Last spring I conferred with Duane La Duke who I knew to have a ranch north of Ely. Duane ensured me that a significant pronghorn population was in the area of his Cherry Creek Ranch. After years of rehab from a significant life changing injury, I thought it was time to try archery antelope again. The Nevada Department of Wildlife agreed and were nice enough to mail me a tag.

Prior to opening day, Duane had done his homework and assured me some nice bucks were calling Cherry Creek Home. On opening day I met Duane, his son Aaron, grandson Jake, and LVWW member Jim Baxter in Ely, after which we headed out to the ranch. A nice buck was seen before we left pavement, but a lack of cover and plenty of food and proximal water kept him unconcerned.

When we made it to the ranch, we found a heard of does and yearlings in the pasture on one side, and a nice solitary buck on the other. Just like our first sighting, this buck was surrounded by good food, water, and 100 yards that needed eliminating before being in range of even the most competent archer.

I watched the buck for two days, patterning his behavior from sun up to sundown. On day two, after the boy settled down for his afternoon nap in the center of a lush irrigated pasture, I set out to explore other promis-

ing areas, including green spots seen on Google Earth

and recommendations from the Department of Wildlife biologist in Ely.

I drove north to Lage's Station where it looked like the end zone at the Super Bowl. Instead of cameras, it was spotting scopes watching elk around the alfalfa fields at Goshute Lake. It was also the first weekend of the depredation archery elk hunt.

The spotters told me of antelope that were skirting around the elk fence and sneaking in the gate. I was lead to believe it looked like the main exit after a concert. Problem was, to set up my blind I'd either have to do it on private property, or on Highway 93. I was also told they'd counted 17 trucks scouting the pastures just that morning. When I finally checked the perimeters myself, I found several antelope egresses; all old. Glassing the interior of the professionally manicured fields, I saw bucks that dreams are made of – all on private property; all 100 yards out of reach.

I moved on to check out some promising units north of Currie. Still no signs. I met another party who'd set up blinds and trail cameras on two guzzlers on the south side of the Dolly Varden Mountains. After running off one buck with a missed shot, all they saw was an elk and a coyote. It was time to return to the ranch and set up on a trail where I knew my old friend liked to have a special snack before bed. I assembled my blind and decoy at the perfect spot, then settled in to watch my quarry prepare for his last meal.

After an hour or so of waiting, I heard yelling from the old ranch house about 200 yards away. As Duane, Jim and the family had already departed, I feared it may



have been one of the local Cherry Creek residents who were known for their aversion to the criminal justice system. Then two gun shots. Holly Crap! A poacher? A hit? From the safety of my concealment (nylon, not Kevlar) I glassed over to see what had happened, perhaps to be an informed witness. I then saw the shooter pick up a dead snake. I later spoke with a Cherry Creek Ranch neighbor (Ralph from Reno – go figure) who admitted his dog had stepped on a buzz tail and had to be told promptly to get off (the yelling) before the rattler was euthanized (the shooting). Oh, and you guessed it... no more antelope; gone; adios; bye-bye.

A few minutes later I was chasing my pop-up blind through the sage brush after a pre-thunder storm guest of wind. Gone; adios, bye-bye? I finally caught it. Thank god no witness.

Now here's my evaluation of whether it was a successful hunt or not:

Success? Oh hell ya! I was there. Coyotes – not sirens. Sage grouse – not pigeons. F-250s – not helicopters. Armed hunters – not armed felons. And some time to get to know Duane, Jim, Aaron and Jake, and even the history of the ranch.

Touching a piece of Nevada for a few days—real Nevada that God created and man may have barely altered; not obliterated. That to me is a successful hunt.

Is a big game hunt a success without a gut pile? Oh hell ya!

I know you can't see the nice buck in the photo above.....that's why you should hunt with a rifle, not a bow.

## Striper Fishing Recap at Lake Mead August 29th



We had a big group of some 16-17 Anglers show up for the last fishing event of the year. The instruction from honcho Randy Weaver was be at the dock by 0500. EVERYONE was on the dock at 0500 waiting for honcho Randy to show up, he made it minus any donuts or coffee for the group or the 3-4 fishing guides he had hired to help us out. 5 or 6 boats headed out for a HOT day of fishing. Mike Taylor and I loaded up with guides Johnny and Jack. According to the guides the action should start right as the sun hits the water. Well 30-40 minutes passed and no action. Then it happened a boil not far away. We struck fast and landed several fish all roughly the same size, when the action finally died down we had roughly 20 fish on the deck. All the boats pretty much stayed together and fished the same areas, with a notable exception, honcho Weaver was no where in sight. Once the

top water action ended we headed to deeper waters and started the jigging techniques, we picked up another 20-30 fish from two differnt locations but again Weaver was absent from the floatilla of boats. Per the rules we were to be back at the dock by 0900 for the weigh-in and cleaning of the fish. Ahhh now we find Weaver at the cleaning station with the heaviest bag at weigh in? I never saw into his bag to confirm that it was fish he was weighing or an anvil. When it was all done Randy Weaver was 1st with the biggest fish and agian in the 2 biggest fish category. Larry Cusimano was second, Scott Akes 3rd, Mark gallear and Brian Patterson tied for 4th. No one saw Weaver fish all morning yet he brings in the heaviest bag of fish?
