BIG GAME HUNT APPLICATION "SEASON"

We have big game hunting season, fishing season, small game hunting season and hunt application season. Now is the application season, this is research and anticipation time for future hunts next fall. All the western states have applications due starting in January clear into June. Its hard to keep up with all of them but its critical if you intend to hunt more than just your home state of Nevada. I have developed an Excel spreadsheet that helps keep me up to date but even with that last year I missed out on my Arizona deer submittal and lost 1 year of bonus point. For 16 years I have been diligent in applying and saving my points to hunt a great unit. Arizona is unique in that by missing one years application I actually lost TWO bonus points (1 for not applying and another for what they call a loyalty point for applying in 5 consecutive years). Now I'm a couple points behind the curve that will cost me a few more years until I am able to draw. If you want to play the game you need to apply and build points, its as simple as that. Nevada has limited resources so you most likely will not be hunting every year in our home state, we need to apply in other states to get that opportunity. Here is a list of western states and the application deadlines:

The Ebb And Flow Of Dogs

"OK, SADIE. Let's go outside."

There is a delay of 10 seconds or so as I wait for Her Majesty to indicate she has heard me. She does not move. I am uncertain whether she is ignoring me or simply cannot hear. "Sadie!" I clap my hands loudly. "SADIE, HERE!"

Finally, Sadie, my 14-year-old English pointer, opens her eyes, takes a moment to consider whether disobedience is an option, then struggles to her feet and totters down the stairs toward the back door, which I am holding open in anticipation of her arrival.

I give a long sigh of relief. If Sadie can get up on her own, she's still OK. In our house, a dog that can't get to her feet by herself soon takes the short road to dog heaven. It's a hard rule, but one we've established after years of watching sad, unhappy dogs kept alive far too long by people who prolonged the dogs' lives for their own misdirected purposes.

Once outside, Sadie starts moving more smoothly. I watch to see where she goes. She's headed out to her same old dumping grounds. Good. One of the first indications a dog is failing is a tendency to start leaving her waste closer and closer to her sleeping quarters. I've had several unpleasant surprises just

outside my back door from previous dogs, so I pay attention. I head inside to take care of some chores, knowing she'll be tap dancing at the back door in a very short time. And sure enough, she is. I get her food ready before I let her in; the alternative is to have her underfoot as I prepare it. This food process makes me grit my teeth every time. For the first 12 years of Sadie's life she ate nothing but high-quality dry dog food and was pleased as punch to have it. But while I was elk hunting two years ago my wife decided Sadie needed a canned food treat to go with that old, boring dry food.

"She's old," I was told. "She needs to be pampered."

"She's a hunting dog," I said. "The last thing she needs is pampering. She gets a couple bites of jerky when we're chasing chukars. She won't know what to do with treats."

As it turns out, Sadie knew exactly what to do with treats, and pretty soon she figured out how to ask for more. I don't allow my dogs to beg, and a dog that forgets the rule receives a light swat. Unfortunately, Sadie is PAAS, (Past the Appropriate Age for Swatting), and she knows it.

So I avoid situations where Sadie might be tempted to beg, because at her stage of life, every temptation slides directly into a crime.

While she is eating I slip into my office and put on my hiking boots. Sadie notices and immediately comes to dance around in front of me, her food forgotten. The only thing she loves more than eating is hunting, and as far as she's concerned, every hike I take is an unannounced hunt. I find it interesting that an ancient pointer is woofing like a pup

and getting in my face every time I bend down to tie my boot laces while my fouryear-old shorthair sits waiting patiently for whatever comes.

"QUIT!" I yell, and Sadie shrinks away. She's always been soft, especially for a pointer. Probably because she was born in the laundry room and raised on my lap until she grew too big to fit under the keyboard.

She brightens immediately, though, as I head out to the truck. Sadie wiggles and prepares to make the jump. Then she prepares some more...and some more. She's almost ready. Almost. When I lift her into the rig she looks at me as if to say, "I could have done it. Really."

She starts out strong on

our hike, but on the way back an hour later she is walking slowly. I wonder about a new dog. It's almost time. The shorthair is coming into her own and can help a pup learn. But not yet. Sadie can still hunt a little...except she can't see or smell any better than she can hear. No sense making her miserable with a young pup climbing all over her.

After we return home, the dogs take a nap. Around noon I decide to give them each a dog biscuit. The shorthair takes hers gracefully and with impeccable manners. Sadie can't hear the offer. I scratch behind her ears and her eyes open.

"Want a biscuit?" I ask.

Sadie wags her tail, smiles and scrambles to get up. But something is not right. Her feet cannot find purchase. She cannot stand. She struggles to no avail, and finally, breathing hard, she looks at me pitifully.

I am shocked, scared in a way I never anticipated. The rule is hard and fast. I look around. No one is near.

"Just this time," I whisper and lift Sadie to her feet, giving her the biscuit. "Just this one time." ■



JOKES

Early aircraft's throttles had a ball on the end of it, in order to go full throttle the pilot had to push the throttle all the way forward into the wall of the instrument panel. Hence "balls to the wall" for going very fast. And now you know, the rest of the story.

During WWII, U.S. airplanes were armed with belts of bullets which they would shoot during dogfights and on strafing runs. These belts were folded into the wing compartments that fed their machine guns. These belts measure 27 feet and contained hundreds of rounds of bullets. Often times, the pilots would return from their missions having expended all of their bullets on various targets. They would say, I gave them the whole nine yards, really meaning they used up all of their ammunition.

In George Washington's days, there were no cameras. One's image was either sculpted or painted. Some paintings of George Washington showed him standing behind a desk with one arm behind his back while others showed both legs and both arms.

Prices charged by painters were not based on how many people were to be painted, but by how many limbs were to be painted. Arms and legs are 'limbs,' therefore painting them would cost the buyer more. Hence the expression, 'Okay, but it'll cost you an arm and a leg.' (Artists know hands and arms are more difficult to paint.)

As incredible as it sounds, men and women took baths only twice a year (May and October). Women kept their hair covered, while men shaved their heads (because of lice and bugs) and wore wigs. Wealthy men could afford good wigs made from wool. They couldn't wash the wigs, so to clean them they would carve out a loaf of bread, put the wig in the shell, and bake it for 30 minutes. The heat would make the wig big and fluffy, hence the term 'big wig'. Today we often use the term 'here comes the Big Wig' because someone appears to be or is powerful and wealthy.

Common entertainment included playing cards. However, there was a tax levied when purchasing playing cards but only applicable to the 'Ace of Spades.' To avoid paying the tax, people would purchase 51 cards instead. Yet, since most games require 52 cards, these people were thought to be stupid or dumb because they weren't 'playing with a full deck.'

Early politicians required feedback from the public to determine what the people considered important. Since there were no telephones, TV's or radios, the politicians sent their assistants to local taverns, pubs, and bars. They were told to 'go sip some Ale and listen to people's conversations and political concerns. Many assistants were dispatched at different times. 'You go sip here' and 'You go sip there.' The two words 'go sip' were eventually combined when referring to the local opinion and, thus we have the term 'gossip.'

At local taverns, pubs, and bars, people drank from pint and quart-sized containers. A bar maid's job was to keep an eye on the customers and keep the drinks coming. She had to pay close attention and remember who was drinking in 'pints' and who was drinking in 'quarts,' hence the phrase' minding your 'P's and Q's'.
