

# October 12th Lunch Program: Raptor hunting...falconer Becca Butcher NEW EVENT THIS YEAR .38cal Pistol Shoot



Honcho **Alan Stone** has a new format for the club to try this month, we will be shooting steel targets on a shooting tree similar to the one shown here. .38cal only, the club will supply the ammo so everyone will be using the same gear in that regard. If you do not have a .38cal or 357 that can shoot .38cal several will be available to barrow/use. Don't let that be the reason you don't come out to shoot this event.

When: Saturday, Oct 22<sup>nd</sup> sign up at 8:30am shooting at 9:00am

Where: CCSC Training Center 50yd range (next to the rifle pistol range)

Cost: \$25 per person

This is a Marksman of the Year event. Lewis Class money will be paid to members in good standing only. Depending on how many people show up, we will shoot either 18 rounds per person or possibly more. The club purchased 500 rounds for the

shoot, so that can accommodate 27 shooters @ 18 rounds each. If we have fewer shooters, then I can modify the shoot to include an additional 6 shots per person at a longer range target with double or triple scoring.

12 shots will be timed, so a reload with speed loaders will be part of the equation (at least for the two guns I am bringing) and that part of the shoot will be timed. 6 shots at a close man size silhouette target; 6 shots at a further target (typical bulls-eye targets). Score for the 12 shots will be divided by the time. The last 6 shots will be at the reactive paddles, and however many get hit (0-6), that number will be added to the individuals score, and the highest total score wins.

## November 5<sup>th</sup> Turkey Shoot at CCSC 50 yd range

.22 pistol Silhouette shoot at steel targets, honcho Don Turner.

On Nov 5 we will have our pistol silhouette shoot at the Clark County shooting complex. Set up at 8am, shoot starts at 9 pm. \$20.00 entry fee and \$5.00 challenge fees. Shooters will have 20 targets, unlimited shots but targets must be taken out in order from far to near. 90 seconds for 20 targets. ALL SAFETY RULES APPLY...

After he finished cleaning his father's hands; the young man stood in silence and then began to tidy and clean up the workshop. That night, the father and son talked for the first time long into the night.

The next morning, the young man went back to the company and was received at the office of the director.

The Director noticed the tears that came forth in the eyes of the young man when He asked him: -"Can you tell me what you did and what you learned yesterday at your home?"

The boy replied: -' I washed my father's hands and when I finished I stayed and cleaned his workshop! '

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### 32 miles and 9+ hours in the saddle.....ouch!



I have mentioned to the Club in the past the Sportsman's Warehouse and Sportsman's News Pro membership program. This program is simple, for a membership cost of \$297/year your name is placed in the barrel to win hunts, fishing trips, guns and gear. You get other perks as well but the main incentive is winning a trip. Drawings are held 3 times per month on the 10<sup>th</sup>, 20<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> of each month, that's 36 drawings a year. So for \$297 or just \$8.25 per drawing your name is in the barrel to win something. An awesome deal.

What can you win? How about a Mexico desert sheep hunt? South Dakota pheasant hunt? Canadian brown bear hunt? New Mexico or Utah elk hunt? Alaska fishing

trip (member Gordon Warren won), Wyoming antelope hunt (member Paul Harris won), Wyoming deer hunt (member Barclay Swan won), Wyoming elk hunt (member Barclay Swan also won that hunt). This is where my story begins with Barclay Swans 2<sup>nd</sup> major hunt win, I was fortunate to be the camera guy to film his hunt. All hunts or fishing trips are filmed to be aired later on Sportsman's Warehouse TV.

The hunt Barclay won was with Open Creek Outfitters from Cody Wyoming. They hunt the remote wilderness area of the Thorofare near the southeast corner of Yellowstone. How remote? 32 miles and 9+ hours on horseback remote....that's remote! I had been into this are before but from the Dubois side and had ridden 21 miles in on horseback. The Deer Creek trail from the Cody side is much steeper and more than 10 miles farther to reach camp. I had no issues with the saddle time on my previous trip but the extra 10-11 miles had me thinking mean and terrible thoughts about how to get back at my horse those last 2 or 3 hours in the saddle. You cannot train for a 9 hour horseback ride, you just have to gut it out. My brother who lives near Cody and rides quite abit warned me the ride is long and "scary" in numerous spots due to steep terrain and narrow trails. Better have a good horse he said, luckily I did.

One day to ride in and a day to ride out and we hunted for 6 days. We had sun, rain, sleet and even 2-3 inches of snow one day. Awesome trip. The main story of our trip was Rick from UT had a bull at over 400 yds. He shot 4 times...hitting it at least 3 and the bull just stood there. After a quick reload he shot again, this time the bull started to run off. Unknown to everyone, a grizzly bear was just up the hill some 100 yds or so and started to chase the wounded elk. The elk jumped over a large deadfall log and Rick didn't know if it died or was hiding from the bear. In no time the bear was on the back of the bull. The bull reared his head and got the bear off him with his sharp horns. Then the bull jumped up and was nose to nose with the bear in a stare down. Well Rick didn't waste any time and quickly shot the bull 2 more times. The last shot finally scared of Mr Grizzly. They still had to go recover the elk, butcher and pack it out before the bear came back to claim what he surely thought was his dinner. There is no video or pictures to back up the story but an awesome story nonetheless. There were a couple other grizzly bear sightings during the week but nothing that can top that encounter.

I suggest you sign on to Sportsman's News and join the Pro Membership for a chance at a hunt of a life time. Four club members have already won! If you sign up, make sure to put my name (Brian Patterson) as the reference. For every 3 new members you refer you get your name in the barrel again and I have not yet won a thing....sure would like to win an easy day chasing pheasants in South Dakota with no horse ride.

So you didn't draw a big game tag this year, big deal. You can still chase quail and chukar. According to NDOW the bird populations in most areas should be good this year. Quail are the perfect bird and the perfect opportunity for this club to get newer members involved. This is the main reason I joined LVWW over 20 years ago. The chance for someone to help point me in the right direction near to town so that I could slip away for a few hours and chase birds. The club is full of wing shooters and many go out every weekend and more. These guys are a great resource on where to go. South toward Searchlight and all the hills and guzzlers there or north toward Glendale Moapa and Logandale with some agricultural edges to hunt or Overton Wildlife Management Area, or go a bit farther to Gold Butte or

#### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*RESPONSE FROM LANDOWNERS - Epic and equitable: \*\*\*\*\*\*\*

"Dear Mr. Niemela:

Thank you for your inquiry regarding accessing our property to survey for the yellow-legged frog. We may be able to help you out with this matter.

We have divided our 2.26 acres into 75 equal survey units with a draw tag for each unit. Application fees are only \$8.00 per unit after you purchase the Frog Survey License (\$120.00 resident / \$180.00 Non-Resident).

You will also need to obtain a Frog Habitat parking permit (\$10.00 per vehicle). You will also need an Invasive Species stamp (\$15.00 for the first vehicle and \$5.00 for each additional vehicle). You will also want to register at the Check Station to have your vehicle inspected for non-native plant life prior to entering our property. There is also a Day Use fee, \$5.00 per vehicle.

If you are successful in the Draw you will be notified two weeks in advance so you can make necessary plans and purchase your Creek Habitat stamp. (\$18.00 Resident / \$140.00 Non-Resident). Survey units open between 8am and 3pm but you cannot commence survey until 9am and must cease all survey activity by 1pm.

Survey Gear can only include a net with a 2" diameter made of 100% organic cotton netting with no longer than an 18" handle, non-weighted and no deeper than 6" from net frame to bottom of net. Handles can only be made of BPA-free plastics or wooden handles. After 1pm you can use a net with a 3" diameter if you purchase the Frog Net Endorsement (\$75.00 Resident / \$250 Non-Resident). Any frogs captured that are released will need to be released with an approved release device back into the environment unharmed.

As of June 1, we are offering draw tags for our Premium Survey units and application is again only \$8.00 per application. However, all fees may be waived upon verification of your Native Indian Tribal rights and status, if aforementioned status applies to you. (Please provide approved, genealogical evidence 30 days in advance for verification.)

You will also need to provide evidence of successful completion of 'Frog Surveys' and your 'Comprehensive course on frog identification, safe handling practices, and self-defense strategies for frog attacks.' These courses are, for your convenience, offered online through an accredited program for a nominal fee of \$750.00. Please let us know if we can be of assistance to you. Otherwise, we must decline your access to our property, but we appreciate your inquiry. Sincerely, Larry & Amanda Anderson"

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
