### Pistol Dueling Tree Shoot July 29th NEW MARKSMAN EVENT THIS YEAR

A big thank you to Honcho Ralph Willits for stepping up to try a new event. This is your club, if you have something fun to try bring it to the board and lets have at it. This shoot will involve center fire pistols only; no magnums, up to .45 caliber. Revolvers or semi-autos. Head to head double elimination. The steel shooting tree target consists of 6 four inch swinging circle discs that are spun to the opposite side when directly impacted by the shooter's bullet. It will be set up at 15 yards with three target discs set on the left side, and three on the right.

Each shooter will load with only 6 rounds of ammunition. 60 seconds will be given for the two shooters to shoot any discs on their side forcing it to their opponent's side. Whoever had the least amount of discs on their side is determined the WINNER of that round. The shooter with the most discs on their side is the LOSER.

Registration – Will be 7:30 a.m. until 8:30 a.m. at CCSC Training Center. Cost is \$20. Shooting to begin at 8:45 a.m. If you show up after 8:30 a.m. you will be given an **X** and sent to the LOSER pot because

duelers have already been selected. Anyone showing up after the first two shooters are called to the line will not be allowed to compete. Las Vegas Woods & Waters will not supply any ammunition. At least one box of 50 is recommended, perhaps a second box if there are a lot of members shooting and you expect to keep winning. Lewis Class money will be paid out. Complete rules and details on page 9-10 of GameBag.

Last month we held another Marksman of the Year shoot. Thursday night was a nice time for the event, weather was great, not too hot, not too cold, with a slight breeze. Twenty shooters came out to enjoy the fun. Most guys don't have their own black powder gun but that's ok everyone shares their gun and helps out. Five guys shot my gun with varying results so there's the proof......it's the shooter not the gun. If you look at the final stats my gun placed 2<sup>nd</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, 14<sup>th</sup> and dead last 20<sup>th</sup>. Al Scholen was the best placing 2<sup>nd</sup> I was in the middle placing 11<sup>th</sup> and John Fenner was the worst placing 20<sup>th</sup>. Heck, John only hit the target once and then he barely hit the paper....I actually saw one

shot hit the ground 20 feet INFRONT of the target and skip UNDER the frame, missed the whole 4'x4' panel! This is all from 50 yards mind you. On the other hand Al had never shot the gun before and placed all his shots in the kill zone and had a pretty tight group that got him second place overall! Proof again it's the shooter not the gun, just wish I could shoot my own gun as well as Al. He is a better shot.

Mike Taylor won the event and took top honors with a score of 45 out of a possible 50, he scored 2 bullseyes, the closest only 9mm from the center. Mike did take the most time to get off his shots and it looks like it paid off, literally...he won \$50 in the Lewis Class. The shoot results shuffled the standings in Marksman of the Year too. Some new names moved up into the top five, see the standings on page 7.

Final score results: 1st Mike Taylor (\$50), 2nd Al Scholen (\$20), 3rd Don Turner (\$10), 4th Larry Cussimano, 5th Mike Reese for the top five shooters. Mike Taylor will get his Marksman coin presented at lunch this month.



Other Lewis Class money winners: Steve Linder (\$50), Ralph Willits (\$20) Jim Baxter (\$10), Clark Balding (\$50), Mark Gallear (\$20) and Duane LaDuke (\$10). ### Heat Warning.....is it hot enough yet?

**Heat stroke**, also known as **sun stroke**, is a severe <u>heat illness</u>, defined as <u>hyperthermia</u> with a <u>body temperature</u> greater than 40.6 °C (105.1 °F) because of environmental heat exposure with lack of <u>thermoregulation</u>. This is distinct from a <u>fever</u>, where there is a <u>physiological</u> increase in the temperature <u>set point</u> of the body. The term "<u>stroke</u>" in "heat stroke" is a <u>misnomer</u> in that it does not involve a blockage or hemorrhage of blood flow to the brain. Preventive measures include drinking plenty of cool liquids and avoiding excessive heat and humidity, especially in unventilated spaces, such as parked cars, that can overheat quickly. Treatment requires rapid physical cooling of the body.

Before a heat stroke occurs, people show signs of <u>heat exhaustion</u> such as dizziness, mental confusion, headaches, and weakness; if a heat stroke occurs when the person is asleep, symptoms may be harder to notice. However, in exertional heat stroke, the affected person may sweat excessively. Young children, in particular, may have <u>seizures</u>. Eventually, <u>unconsciousness</u>, <u>organ failure</u>, and death will result.

Heat stroke occurs when thermoregulation is overwhelmed by a combination of excessive metabolic production of heat (exertion), excessive environmental heat, and insufficient or impaired heat loss, resulting in an abnormally high body temperature. Substances that inhibit cooling and cause dehydration such as <u>alcohol</u>, stimulants, <u>medications</u>, and <u>age-related</u> physiological changes predispose to so-called "classic" or non-exertional heat stroke (NEHS), most often in elderly and infirm individuals in summer situations with insufficient ventilation. Exertional heat stroke (EHS) can happen in young people without health problems or medications – most often in <u>athletes</u>, outdoor <u>laborers</u>, or <u>military personnel</u> engaged in <u>strenuous hot-weather activity</u> or in <u>certified first responders</u> wearing heavy <u>personal protective equipment</u>. In environments that are not only hot but also humid, it is important to recognize that <u>humidity</u> reduces the degree to which the body can cool itself by perspiration and evaporation. For humans and other <u>warm-blooded</u> animals, excessive body temperature can disrupt enzymes regulating biochemical reactions that are essential for cellular respiration and the functioning of major organs.

#### **Prevention:**

The risk of heat stroke can be reduced by observing precautions to avoid overheating and dehydration. Light, loose-fitting clothes will allow perspiration to evaporate and cool the body. Wide-brimmed hats in light colors help prevent the sun from warming the head and neck. Vents on a hat will help cool the head, as will sweatbands wetted with cool water. Strenuous exercise should be avoided during daylight hours in hot weather, as should remaining in confined spaces (such as automobiles) without <u>air-conditioning</u> or adequate <u>ventilation</u>.

In hot weather, people need to drink plenty of cool liquids to replace fluids lost from <u>sweating</u>. <u>Thirst</u> is not a reliable sign that a person needs fluids. A better indicator is the color of <u>urine</u>. A dark yellow color may indicate dehydration.

#### **Treatment:**

Treatment of heat stroke involves rapid mechanical cooling along with standard resuscitation measures. The body temperature must be lowered quickly. The person should be moved to a cool area (indoors, or at least in the shade) and clothing removed to promote heat loss (passive cooling). Active cooling methods should also be used, if possible: The person is bathed in cold water, or a hyperthermia vest can be applied. (However, wrapping the person in wet towels or clothes can actually act as insulation and increase the body temperature.) Cold compresses to the <u>torso</u>, head, neck, and <u>groin</u> will help cool the victim. A fan or dehumidifying air-conditioning unit may be used to aid in evaporation of the water (evaporative method).

Why mention all this? I personally had an experience of heat stroke/exhaustion recently on a camping trip. I was enjoying a natural hot spring, over heated and simply passed out, the quick thinking of my friends got me cooled down quickly and I was able to recover. Make sure to take all the needed precautions when out and about any time of year but especially in the summer.

You can hang your head in prayer at the Wall and listen closely, for the ghosts of our generation will speak to you, will share with you the horror and futility of an unwelcome combat war. You will hear the whispers of all 58,318 American men and women who perished or disappeared in that war. You will see their faces in the rice paddies and jungles of Viet Nam, reflected in that black, Gabbro Wall. You will see that faraway, thousand mile stare so common among combat soldiers. You will see all that, feel all that, but you can never know, unless you were there, what terrible, unforgettable horrors our boys encountered in the full bloom of their youth. You can weep, and your tears will fall to the Earth, where so many tears have fallen before, but they, too, will fall in vain. For those tears, and all the many millions that have been shed at the foot of the Wall, can irrigate nothing but regret. For nothing but regret can bloom in the shadow of the Wall. Seize the Truth

### **DUELING PISTOL RULES**

A new shooting event for our club. This shoot will involve center fire pistols only; no magnums, up to .45 caliber. Revolvers or semi-autos. Head to head double elimination. The steel shooting tree target consists of 6 four inch swinging circles discs that are spun to the opposite side when directly impacted by the shooter's bullet. It will be set up at 15 yards with three target discs set on the left side, and three on the right.

Competitors will be given a poker chip upon registration to put their name on. Each chip will then be placed into a draw pot to determine who they will be shooting against. Two competitors will be drawn at random.

Each shooter will load with only 6 rounds of ammunition. 60 seconds will be given for the two shooters to shoot any discs on their side forcing it to their opponent's side. Whoever had the least amount of discs on their side is determined the **WINNER** of that round. The shooter with the most discs on their side is the **LOSER**.

A **Verification Judge** will ensure that shooter will only load with 6 rounds. Shooting a gun loaded with more than 6 rounds will result in being classified as a **LOSER**. The **verification judge** will also determine if a shooter fired after the 60 seconds have elapsed, in which case all rounds fired after the time limit will not count.

After a pair of shooters have dueled, the **LOSER**'S chip will be marked with an **X** and placed into the **LOSER**'S pot. The **WINNER**'S chip will be placed into a pot labeled **WINNER**.

After all shooters have shot and their poker chip appropriately sorted, all chips will again be placed into the Draw pot. Duelers will again be drawn and shoot. The **WINNER** will again be placed into the **WINNER** pot. The **LOSER**'S chip will again be marked with an **X**. If this is the shooter's first loss, the chip will be placed into the **LOSER** pot. If that shooter already had an **X** on the chip, his chip will be marked with a second X and placed into the **GO HOME** pot. When all shooters have shot in the second round, the chips will again be mixed up in the draw to determine who shoots against who in the next round.

This sequence will continue until everyone but the ultimate champion has received a **XX** on their poker chip and placed in **GO HOME**. After the first round, the Honcho will determine if the round times need to be reduced to 30 seconds, or even 15 or 20 seconds.

#### TIES

- When at the conclusion of a 60 seconds round, there are 3 discs on the left and three on the right. Another round will be conducted. If a third round is required, it will be 30 seconds. Any subsequent rounds required to break a tie will be 15 seconds.
- If there is only one shooter/chip left in the draw pot after the last round, that remaining shooter/chip must shoot against the last *WINNER* to determine the champion.

<u>Odd Man in Draw</u> – When drawing duelers from the draw pot, there will be times when there is only one shooter remaining. He will be selected to shoot the next round and his opponent will be drawn from the newly filled draw pot of *WINNERS* and *LOSERS* starting the next round.

<u>SAFETY</u> – All firearms will be unloaded until at the shooting line and instructed to load (6 rounds) by the *Verification Judge*. After the round is completed, the *Verification Judge* will ensure both guns are empty. The shooter may then holster an <u>EMPTY</u> weapon if he has a holster designed for that particular make and model. If the shooter does not have a holster, he will place the pistol on the gun table with the action open. Only the two shooters, the Verification Judge, RSO, and timer will be allowed beyond the yellow line once the competition begins. Once the previous two shooters have reset the target, safely secured their guns, and retired behind the yellow line, only then can the next two shooters approach the shooting line. You may take and load your magazine (or speed loader) when not on the line to prepare for your next dual.

<u>Registration</u> – Will be 7:30 a.m. until 8:30 a.m. Shooting to begin at 8:45 a.m. If you show up after 8:30 a.m. you will be given an **X** and sent to the *LOSER* pot because duelers have already been selected. Anyone showing up after the first two shooters are called to the line will not be allowed to compete. If you do not have a suitable holster, place your **UNLOADED** gun (action open) on the gun table. Las Vegas Woods & Waters will not supply any ammunition. At least one box of 50 is recommended, perhaps a second box if there are a lot of members shooting and you expect to keep winning.

**Scoring for Club Points**: When a shooter is "Sent Home" with his 2<sup>nd</sup> X, his name will be place at the bottom of the page; each subsequent shooter's name with **XX** will be placed over his name until the champion is at the top. Any ties to determine club points will compete in a 15 second round.

<u>PIZZA</u> – Location will be announced at the conclusion of the event after all brass has been picked up. Unless you have a doctors excuse, was eligible to vote in the Nixon/Kennedy election, and don't do your share, you will not be told where. (Clue: it's air conditioned!).


