That's right, the spring turkey season has not been shut down and we still have time to apply for big game tags. While I've received a lot of calls lately to find out what's really going on and how serious is this pandemic, my quick answer is yes Las Vegas has been affected more than what the news is reporting! Shocker huh? Yes, that's right the news groups have been under reporting the positive cases. Case in point as an example from 3pm on April 1st until 3 pm on April 2nd there were 229 new cases of positives in the Valley health care hospitals. That doesn't include UMC, Sunrise and the Roses. During that same period there were 17 deaths related to the virus. The news reports 5 deaths in the

same time period! You can make your own guess as to why this is happening in the media! What I will tell you is that this is very very preventable!! How you ask? Hunting story form Nov 1999, I may have had some hair then?

Quail Hunt...Brian Patterson

A few weeks ago I was invited to join with members Ron LaBar, Steve Carpenter and his new yellow lab Bailey for a quick quail hunt to a secrete spot Ron had discovered while hunting dove. This secrete spot is only one hour from Vegas and as I will tell contained a lot of birds. It held A LOT of birds before we arrived and still holds A LOT of birds today. Let me interject here that the three hunters mentioned shoot on the Wednesday trap league and although we are not in the running for first place, anyone who shoots 50 rounds a week for the past three years should be able to connect on a flying object whether clay or foul.

Just as Ron had promised we quickly found a covey of 20-30 birds and quickly discovered what poor shots we really are, none fell. We moved through the field and jumped more and more birds, it was not until my 17th or 18th shot that I was able to connect. It was a clean shot that rolled the cock in the dirt. As I was reloading for another shot I looked up to see the only bird I'd hit all day get up and run some 40 yards into the thickest tangle of brush and mesquite in the country. Got away. Ron was not shooting much better but compared to Steve and I, he was the Michael Jordan of quail hunting, at least for one morning when every easy shot came his way. Steve and I either had the sun in our eyes, dust kicked in our face by the flurry of birds at our feet, or whipped in the shin by a thorny mesquite as we shot, or just the plain fact that the birds were taking a hard left or right into a tangle of brush. As the day turned out we kicked birds around for 5-6 hours, I shot 30-35 times and only brought home two. Steve did about the same and Ron ended up with five.

As this was a super secrete spot and Ron and Steve were unavailable the following weekend, I blindfolded Craig Wright and Darrel Dalton and off we went. This weekend was just as much fun with much the same results as the previous outing. It seems Craig and Darrel are no better shots than the rest of us. We saw a lot of birds and shot a lot which is fun but you'd think we could bring a few home. Now there are five of us that know the location to a lot of birds, this little honey hole should remain the same unless someone tells a real shooter.

Opening Day of Quail Season – 2009 Brian Patterson

Opening day this year Paul Harris, Tucker (his yellow lab) and Steve Carpenter and I decided to try our luck. I had found several good covies three weeks ago when out looking for dove. So off we went to that popular spot....you know the one, within 75 miles of Vegas, off the pavement a few miles, down that wash to the right, next to the brownish green brush. Well that's where we went.

We got there right at sun up and began our stalk down the left side of the valley. No birds in the spots they had been in a few weeks earlier, so we kept on walking. Then once we got to that brownish green bush up jumped a few birds. I swung on one to the left and pulled the trigger, surprised the heck out of me when he fell right there, wow 1 for 1. (I should have quit right then).

Steve never got a shot off and I can't remember now if Paul got one or not. We jumped them again and I had a couple clean misses and Steve got one that was unrecoverable, and then I hit one that was unrecoverable, Paul got one or two I think.

We roamed around to a few other locations nearby and I got a single then I went on a string of misses that would last the rest of the day. Oh I had plenty of shots 20-25 in all by my guesstimate but only hit 3 birds and only picked up 2 of them. Paul made some pretty good shots and Tucker did an amazing job with one retrieve that he practically had to climb a tree to get the bird. Amazing job how he got those birds. Paul ended up with the most birds but most of his shots were out of my view. I cant say for sure, but I know trying to hit them out of the air....(the sporting practice Steve and I employed), seemed to result in a lot fewer birds that whatever method Paul was using.

We ended up taking an unfamiliar road into some new country and we discovered a very neat canyon and some great rock formations. We weren't really lost but we didn't really know where we were either....still not sure where we where. After about 25 miles of rough road crawling we got turned back

due to the road conditions. We'll have to go back some day with the quads and explore more of that region...if we can find it again.

In the end my index finger got the work out it needed but I either need a new gun or new glasses if I expect to eat any quail this year. Anyone want to take me out to their secrete spot? I promise I won't impact the quail population but my trigger finger needs the exercise.

Thanksgiving Day Quail – 2010 Brian Patterson

I got up early before the sun and all the food and festivities of joining the Carpenters for turkey day. I headed to my spot near Glendale to try and call in a coyote early then chase quail as the day progressed. The thermometer said it was cold, 17 degrees in the canyon when I parked. I gathered all my gear for both coyotes and quail and walked quietly about ½ mile to my calling set up in the rocks. I spent a half hour or so calling with no success then waited another 15 mins and still nothing. Its was warming up so I hid my coyote gear in a bush and started out for quail.

It must have just warmed up enough cause as soon as I dropped into the wash a covey exploded from their roost in the tamarisk trees. I chased down a few, got some shots, 1 bird in the bag. Then I headed through the slot canyon trimming brush and trees with my pruning sheers I brought just for that purpose. Now I have a good clear trail into my prime spot. I hunted the north side of the river and saw no birds? Then I made my way to the metal bridge....it was newly planked with boards so I can walk across easily. On the other side it wasn't until I got across from the guage station that I jumped some birds. A good kill that landed on the other side (I marked it and would look for him on my way back around, this was the only bird I didn't recover all day). I eased around the river and brush and jumped 4-5 covies total. I was on fire for recovery. I dropped a bird and another exploded I dropped him too.....it appeared they went down in the same spot. I fought my way into the tamarisk and found a bird on the ground. Standing there I guessed the other to be very close by. I spun around and there he was hung up in the tree, not even one step I picked up the double.

Hunting alone I slowed way down and would walk slow through the busted covey and singles would get nervous and jump. I did some good shooting that way. Almost back around adjacent to the truck I got into a huge covey 40-50 birds. I was counting 7 of 18 shooting when they blew out. I dropped one, picked him up. Others jumped I got one down by the river. I'll never find him. But I crawled down there anyway.....sure enough he was sitting in a tree, alive. I reached for him and just got tail feathers. So I eased closer and grabbed him and wrung his neck. I got back out and they kept jumping. 3 here 2 there....I only had 4 shells in my vest. In the excitement I didn't remember my count, 8,9, or maybe 10? I decided rather than chase the covey with only 4 shells I had a great day and would head for the truck.

When I stopped to begin cleaning a head popped up? One was still alive! I grabbed him quick and to my amazement it was the tail featherless bird from the tree. I really wrung his neck this time. In my bag there were 9 total birds, 1 shy of my limit. A great day. Thanksgiving 2010.

Diseases you Could Get from Ticks on Coyotes.....No Not COVID-19

Coyotes are like hairy cruise ships for ticks, which enjoy riding along for the buffet and scenery while passing along diseases.

The coyote's head and ears would be the top deck, perfect for a tick to command the best views of the den, pups, woods, pastures and prospective food. After a few days on the *Coyote Queen*, the ticks have their fill and drop off to spread their disease and nastiness elsewhere.

If you're fortunate enough to knock down some coyotes while hunting, just remember they're likely harboring ticks, fleas and other things. That's one reason I use <u>a Slay Bag to haul out the nasty critters</u>. The bag is tough, easy to use and clean, and is a great investment. If you haven't seen this, <u>definitely check it out</u>.

Ticks are parasites and can pass along diseases you don't want. Here are some of the ones the <u>Centers for Disease Control</u> says ticks can pass to humans.

Anaplasmosis Severe and life-threatening illness is less common with anaplasmosis compared to other rickettsial diseases, such as Rocky Mountain spotted fever (RMSF) or *E. chaffeensis* ehrlichiosis. While the case-fatality rate among patients who seek care for the illness is less than 1 percent, predictors of a more severe course include advanced age, immunosuppression, comorbid medical conditions, and delay in diagnosis and treatment.

Where is it found? Anaplasmosis is most frequently reported from the Upper Midwest and northeastern United States in areas that correspond with the known geographic distribution of Lyme disease and other *Ixodes scapularis*-transmitted diseases.

Babesiosis *Babesia* infection can range from asymptomatic to life threatening. Risk factors for severe babesiosis include asplenia, advanced age, and impaired immune function. Severe cases can be associated with marked thrombocytopenia, disseminated intravascular coagulation, hemodynamic instability, acute respiratory distress, renal failure, hepatic compromise, altered mental status, and death.

Where is it found? Babesiosis is most frequently reported from the northeastern and Upper Midwestern United States.

Lyme Possibly the most commonly known diseease associated with ticks along with Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever. Lyme disease was first identified in Lyme, Conn., and includes symptoms such as a red ring-like expanding rash, and flulike symptoms including malaise, headache, fever, myalgia and arthralgia.

Where is it found? Lyme disease is most frequently reported from the Upper Midwestern and northeastern United States. Some cases are also reported in northern California, Oregon, and Washington. In 2015, 95 percent of Lyme disease cases were reported from 14 states: Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Virginia and Wisconsin.

Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever RMSF is most often transmitted by the American dog tick in the Eastern, Central and Western United States; by the Rocky Mountain wood tick in the Rocky Mountain states; and by the brown dog tick in the Southwestern United States, along the U.S.-Mexico border. RMSF can be rapidly fatal if not treated within the first five days of symptoms. Before tetracycline antibiotics were available, case fatality rates ranged from 20 to 80 percent.

Where is it found? Although RMSF cases have been reported throughout most of the contiguous United States, five states (North Carolina, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Tennessee, and Missouri) account for over 60 percent of RMSF cases. RMSF has become increasingly common in certain areas of Arizona over the last several years; between 2003 and 2016, over 360 cases and 21 fatalities occurred.

Tickbourne Relapsing Fever Primarily found in western states, Tickbourne Relapsing Fever symptoms may include headache, myalgia, chills, nausea, vomiting, arthralgia and in rare instances some facial palsy.

Where is it found? TBRF occurs most commonly in 14 western states: Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Oregon, Texas, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming. Most cases occur in the summer when people vacation and sleep in rustic cabins. However, TBRF can also occur in the winter months when fires started to warm a cabin activate ticks resting in the walls and woodwork. In Texas, TBRF may be associated with cave exposure.

If You're Bitten Ticks cling to the edges of leaves, grass and shrubs seeking a host to latch onto. That could be an animal or a human.

Before going into the woods, tuck your pants into boots and hose down with your favorite tick repellent. I've used a bunch of them over the years including <u>Sawyer's</u> (which has 0.5 percent Permethrin), <u>OFF! Deep Woods</u> (which has 25 percent Deet), Repel (40 percent Deet) and straight Deet while on a fishing trip in Canada in 1996.

The <u>Elimitick line of apparel from GameHide</u> is worth your time to consider, too. It's comfortable, well made and helps repel ticks and other insects via an active ingredient bonded to the fabric fibers. It works.

The CDC recommends these steps to remove a tick if you're bitten:

- 1. Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible. The key is to remove the tick as soon as possible. Avoid folklore remedies such as using nail polish, petroleum jelly, or heat to make the tick detach from the skin.
- 2. Pull upward with steady, even pressure. Don't twist or jerk the tick; this can cause the mouth-parts to break off and remain in the skin. If this happens, remove the mouth-parts with clean tweezers. If you are unable to remove the mouth parts easily, leave them alone and let the skin heal.
- 3. After removing the tick, thoroughly clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol, an iodine scrub, or soap and water.

Whether you're hunting predators, deer, elk, working on your camp, going hiking or doing anything else outdoors, be aware of the risk of ticks. You don't want to become a cruise liner for one of them.
