22 Pistol Shoot – Changed from Center Fire Pistol

.22 revolver or semi-auto load with 6 rounds. Head-to-head double elimination. .22 LR only. Iron sights only - no red dot, no laser, no optics. Dueling tree format.

Ralph Willits & Jeff Bryant are the honchos and they have put a lot of thought into the shoot format scoring and safety for the event. This is 22 pistol only **NO MAGNUMS**, **no hollow points** due to scarcity of center fire ammo, revolvers or semi-autos, no laser or optic sights (fiber optic front sight ok) IRON sights for this competition. Cost is \$20 per shooter, be prepared to shoot 100 rounds, bring your own gun and ammo. Some may only shoot 12 shots if eliminated early. Random pairing of shooters will go head to head in a double elimination competition.

The targets: There will be 6 round disc flip targets on a tree –both shooters have 6 shots to push as many targets to the opposite side, last man standing. Target distance will be determined at the set up. Sign in at 12 noon, shooting starts at 12:30 CCSC Training center range. For Lewis Class ties, there will be a shoot off.

Comins Fishing Results



After a huge turn out of 20 anglers for Sunnyside, we only managed 6 fishermen for the Comins Lake event. The news must have gotten out, the fishing was great but the "catching" was more challenging. The weather was fine, not too cold with some intermittent gusts of wind but not bad. Lots of fish were cruising the shore line just a few feet out, 8-15 feet. Early in the day I saw Tony Perkins land a nice looking BIG trout just down the shoreline, however as he attempted to get it in his cooler the big one got away! There was very little catching going on, but LOTS of fish seen swimming by. I could see 40-50 anglers spread out along the shore or in boats and no one seemed to be hooking up very often. EXCEPT there were four fly fishermen on the far south end of the boat launch area, they seemed to be hooking into fish pretty regularly.

Steve Carpenter and I were fly fishing and not having much luck at all. Me 1 or 2 and Steve about the same. Finally around 10am I asked Steve, "are you going to go down there and see what they are using?" Steve just shrugged his shoulders. About 11am I asked Steve again, "are you going to go down there and see what they are using?" Again not much of a response. It was getting ridiculous as they were consistently catching fish while NOONE else around the lake seemed to be having much action. I started to look at my watch and timed as little as 3 mins

between fish and as much as 12 mins between one or more of the four guys hooking and landing a fish. So again roughly noon I ask "are you going to go down there and see what they are using?" again no reply. I let another 30-40 minutes pass before I finally pulled in my line and walked down there myself.

I stood behind one of the guys and watched his presentation and tried to look at how his line was rigged up. Then I mentioned "you guys seem to be the only ones catching fish, what are you using?" He replied "anything" we are all using a different fly and all are catching fish but they were fishing close to the surface only about 18-24" down, we had been fishing deeper near where the fish were cruising the shore. He named off a few of the fly patterns they were using and then I ambled back to my location. Steve of course wanted to know what I found out. I relayed the information and we both rigged up similar to the four other fly fishermen. The next 2 hours produced NOTHING. Ugh.

2pm rolled around, the official weigh in time for the LVWW event. Six anglers were present, 4 fish were weighed in. Luke Weber and Steve Carpenter did not have a fish to weigh. Robert Gaudet had a nice fish at 2.66lbs, but Tony Perkins brought in a fish that was a tiny bit heavier at 2.67lbs, Ashur Weber's fish weighed 1.54 lbs. Last was my fish that looked very much the same size as Robert and Tony's....as I tried to get it on the scale I dropped the scale in the water.....it would not register after getting wet. Luke retrieved a different scale that we used to mark the fish at 2.5lbs (it may have been a tad bigger/smaller without the digital format to confirm) so my fish ended up in third place.

The real story was not the fishing, Robert Gaudet pulled into the weigh-in with a story. Driving up the night before he swerved to miss a car in his lane and ended up laying his travel trailer on its right side in the middle of the highway. I couldn't believe the story and after looking at the side of his trailer he was very very lucky, it barely had a scratch on it!!! Unbelievable! The tongue of the trailer and hitch were all twisted and bent, and Robert and his truck were OK. Robert was certainly still shook up a bit telling the story, wow. We are very fortunate that he wasn't hurt. Another reminder for us all to be careful and thankful for the time we are able to get out, and able to go home safely.

Angler Killed by Grizzly in first attack of 2021



Carl Mock was enjoying a day of spring fishing on the Madison River north of West Yellowstone, Montana, on Thursday, April 15 when he was mauled by a big, boar grizzly bear.

The 40-year-old resident of West Yellowstone managed to call 911 despite suffering significant scalp and facial wounds. Emergency crews headed to the Baker's Hole Campground area and found Mock within an hour.

The first responders transported Mock by toboggan and snowmobile to an ambulance then to the Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center in Idaho Falls. Mock passed away Saturday morning in Idaho Falls following a massive stroke.

<u>According to Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks</u>, Mock was carrying bear spray when he was attacked. Although the safety tab was found off, it's unclear whether he was able to deploy the canister.

A group of seven investigators including FWP game wardens, Forest Service rangers, and bear specialists returned to the scene on Friday to assess public safety risks. The group made lots of noise walking in to the site in attempt to alert bears in the area, but they were immediately charged by a large boar.

The group attempted to haze the bear away but were unsuccessful. Members of the team were ultimately forced to shoot the bear dead at only 20 yards.

Investigators later found a moose carcass cached within 50 yards of the original attack site, indicating that the bear was defending the food during both incidents. The USFS issued an emergency public safety closure of the area on Thursday that still remains in effect.

This is the second mauling of 2021 in the U.S. but the first to occur in the Lower 48. The first attack happened near Haines, Alaska, in February when a group of backcountry skiers stumbled upon a brown bear den, awakening the bear from its state of torpor.

Friends set up a GoFundMe campaign to aid Mock's family with medical bills and funeral costs.

"Carl had such passion for outdoors, hiking, fishing, photography, and was a beloved guide to countless visitors in Yellowstone," wrote Keith Johnson, who organized the fundraiser. He described Mock as a "hard-working guy with an infectious smile."

I will be hunting elk this fall near this area, lots of bears have always been spotted on this hunt and there have been several close encounters with bears. I have my bear spray plus plenty of ammo if needed.

COOLER CRITIQUE Like most of us, I spent the better part of my life transiting through an assortment of ice chests. And yes, there are still a few left in my garage. Special occasions, particular size, durability, etc. Last season I got a Nevada Pronghorn tag (I got a tag.... Let's just leave it at that!). Unlike the




last harvest that was only a few miles from my house in Washoe County, 6,700 feet in elevation, and raining, this trip included the real threat of meat spoilage. Oh, and hunter spoilage; it was well into the 90's each day, and several hours of dirt road from Ely. I wanted cool retention for 4-6 days in the Nevada Desert.

I shopped around to find the big guy (77 qt.) that would hold lots of cold beverage and retain ice as long as possible. If I dropped an animal, I wanted ice and room enough to cool the meat until I made it to the processor. I checked numerous independent web sites that tested up to a dozen or more

manufactures in identical conditions. Then the cost thing.

Site after site came up with LIFETIME High Performance Coolers as close to the best, just as good as the best, or better than most all others tested. Yup, that includes Coleman, Igloo, Rtic, Engel, Ozark, Orca, Pelican, several others, and dare I say Yeti!

It's certified Grizzly proof. The drain hole has a garden hose fitting, has a built in bottle opener, and it's lockable. Now get this: MADE IN AMERICA! And the price: ½ to 1/3 of the price of the fancy ones. Great for what I needed. It did what I wanted it to do. If you're a guide or out a week at a time, several times per summer, maybe paying out the big bucks is in order. Or maybe not. Ralph Willits
