22 rifle and pistol shoot

If you were not there, you missed a great time. First, we had food, Hamburgers, cheeseburgers, chips, deserts and drinks. Some even had doubles and a few big eaters had triple burgers. There was lots of food and no one was hungry after. Much thanks to Jorge A for cooking and those who helped set up and clean up.

The shoot was as follows: First the honcho made a rule change and the steel targets shot by a rifle were scored as 10 points each knocked down in 60 seconds for a total of 150 points. You had a onetime buy back if you wanted on the steels. A few guys bought back not because of bad shots, but for their equipment malfunctioning. "You SHOULD know your equipment is ready before you get to the range or even worse, your hunt" Most knocked down all 15 steels but some were not as lucky.

Second was the pistol shoot at a paper target at 25 yards. This score was added to the rifle score for your total. For a twist you drew a playing card that was cut in half and who ever had the other half was your partner. The two of your scores were added together for a \$50 prize. We had, believe it, a tie between two teams.

To break the tie, I had the two teams shoot at 15 steels each team and the team who knocked them down first took the \$50. The money went to Wyatt Palmer and Julius Fortuna. Big winners for the night were Wyatt Palmer 217, Roger Palmer 210, and John Mittness 206 Lewis class money went to nine shooters.

I think next shoot we need someone watching the Plamers as they were also the score keepers!

Recipe of the month

One-Pan Crispy Chicken Primavera

preview for One-Pan Crispy Chicken Primavera Is The King Of Spring Comfort Food

Just when you thought pasta primavera was the king of spring comfort food, we're dropping this one-pan chicken primavera. Crispy-skinned chicken thighs are roasted alongside spring veggies and topped with a confetti of goat cheese and herbs for a dinner that captures the promise of warmer days while bringing the cozy vibes we crave.

The chicken:

Starting in a cold pan is the secret to the crispiest chicken skin. Lay the thighs skin side down, set the pan over medium heat, and leave it be for at least 10 minutes. As the pan heats up, the fat between the chicken skin and meat will slowly render, leaving the skin extra-thin and crispy. Resist the urge to move the chicken around in the pan during this initial cooking time, even to peek underneath it. This disturbs the formation of that beautiful crispy skin and might even cause it to tear. And if you think it's sticking, don't panic: The chicken will release from the pan when it's ready. Just take a deep breath and let it cook a few minutes more.

The vegetables:

If you've never tasted a roasted radish, prepare to be astonished. Raw radishes have a strong, peppery bite, but when roasted, that sharpness mellows out and the radishes become excellent

sponges for whatever flavors surround them. In this case, they're soaking up tons of chicken schmaltz—and what's better than that? Similar to a potato, radishes need to be seasoned heavily, so don't be shy with the salt.

The toppings:

In keeping with the springtime flare, this one-pan dinner is showered with an abundance of mint, basil, and goat cheese. The freshness of the herbs and the tang of the cheese wake up the rich schmaltzy chicken and vegetables. Even if you don't typically top your meals with multiple fresh herbs, I urge you to go all in here. Anything labeled "primavera" deserves to be topped with exuberance.

Ingredients

1 Tbsp.

neutral oil

4

bone-in, skin-on chicken thighs (about 2 lb.)

2 1/2 tsp.

kosher salt

1/2 tsp.

freshly ground black pepper

12 oz.

radishes, stemmed, halved

shallot, finely chopped

6 oz.

asparagus, trimmed, sliced into 2" pieces

1/2 cup

frozen petite peas, thawed

2 oz.

goat cheese

2 Tbsp.

finely chopped fresh basil
