

CAB update for January

In January 2026, the **Clark County Advisory Board to Manage Wildlife (CCABMW)** held its primary meeting on **January 20, 2026**, to review and provide recommendations on several major state wildlife regulations.

Meeting Highlights & News

Hunting Seasons & Quotas: The board reviewed and discussed recommendations for the **2026 dream tag** species, seasons, and quotas. They also deliberated on the **2026-2027 hunting seasons** and quotas for restricted non-resident guided mule deer.

Predator Management: Discussions included a presentation on the **Predator Management Plan** for fiscal year 2026, which was subsequently considered by the Nevada Board of Wildlife Commissioners later in the month.

Coyote Hunting Contests: The board reviewed proposed amendments to **NAC 503** concerning season and licensing requirements for participants in coyote hunting contests.

Board Member Update: In late January 2026, Clark County Commissioners deferred a decision regarding the reappointment of longtime board member and trapper **Tracy Truman**, despite recommendations for his continued service.

Special Permits: Revisions to the **disability permit program** were also on the radar for review during the advisory cycle.

Upcoming Schedule

The board is scheduled to meet again on **March 10, 2026**, at the Clark County Government Center to support the Nevada Board of Wildlife Commissioners meeting held in Boulder City later that week.




The Great Bison Freeze

I get my first inkling that I may be in over my head when I step out of the truck to put binos on the first group of bison. The windchill of -19F reddening and burning any exposed flesh within seconds pushes us all back in the truck fairly quickly. With the sun creeping over the horizon, we take stock of our mettle, and I internally wonder about the over confidence of decisions made in more comfortable places.

It was indoors with the heat, quality sleep, and excellent wi-fi that I convinced myself hauling North Americas largest critter still roaming around, off the Montana mountains with 75-year-old Randel and an 84-year-old dad in December wouldn't be too much trouble. Randel is part of the conservation group where we got the tag from so he offered to help with the hunt. I tend to research every little thing and overanalyze all possible outcomes of an adventure before lacing up my boots. I anticipated 3000 miles of steering wheel time, a half million acres to search for a lazy 1-ton critter, and a day or 2 of field dressing and pack out. But dangerous? It didn't really cross my mind. Later that night I relay the days happenings to a well-traveled hunter buddy of mine; he cautioned we were in a downright dangerous situation and to be careful. Weird, it didn't feel all that dangerous as we crept from one bison group to another in search of the perfect bull on a once-in-a-lifetime bucket list hunt for dad.

We spent the entire first day driving to the tops of each mountain and to the bottom of each canyon trying to find where all the bison were hiding. Most were low in canyons smartly keeping out of the wind, but some were on the march to new areas or just running away from us as we got closer. We were getting pretty good at guessing age class of each group or so we told ourselves. By lunch time, with the sun high in the sky, it had warmed up a bit to a balmy 18 degrees. I jumped out to get in the cooler in the back of the truck to get the lunch fixings. Since I wasn't about to have a picnic in these conditions, I brought it back up front and realized my packing wasn't as well thought out as it should have been. I didn't pack any ice; certain mother nature would not warm up the cooler contents. I didn't expect the meat to be crystalized and some drinks frozen solid in the cooler. I am well out of my comfort zone. Note to self: if you want drinkable water, in liquid form, bring bottles inside at night.

Close to the end of the day we ran across a bachelor herd of some decent bulls. When we crested the hill, I saw one big old nasty bull near the road that was just staring at us with a look that suggested we owe him money. I said that if that bull is near the road in the morning, we should give it a try. The three of us drove the hour and half back to town discussing how we could make it happen the next day or if it was even possible. Randel and Dad being ever positive were all too eager to lay the smack down on that old bull anywhere he was. I suggested we wait for him to walk on to the road then try and drop him.

The next morning the temps had dropped even lower, but the wind had slowed a bit making conditions almost bearable. The weatherman was calling for even higher temperatures the following morning but that would be the last day of the hunt. I may not have known about freezing points of deli meats, but I know enough, to not wait to the last minute. Murphys law always has different plans and you may lose your chance forever. Sometimes you get skunked and that was the best you could do and other times you make mistakes like trying to wait to get that extra 5 degrees of warmth. I wasn't taking any chances, so we drove straight to where we left that nasty old bull the night before. As we crested the hill we saw the three younger ones, but no big nasty. Dang! I guess we missed our chance. We continued around the hill and suddenly there he was right between two roads that came together. A perfect spot so maybe he would run and die on one of the roads so that we could get in the truck at any time we were getting too cold during the gutting and meat hauling process. Big nasty had other plans for us.

We drove down the road a bit and parked over a rise. We had the wind in our favor but unfortunately, I think it favored Big Nasty too. It was just too nippy to shoot without warm gloves on. If you have ever tried to shoot with bulky gloves you know it's nearly impossible to be accurate with heavy gloves. We crest the little rise and get set up. The first shot rings out and big nasty doesn't even know he is hit but he starts running. Dad sends three more shots and I know at least two more hit but he was so far away for the final shot I didn't hear if it hit. We all look at each other not believing what just happened. It was a perfect setup and that big beast just shrugged off three solid hits and kept running. We drive up on the next rise and see him running off with a herd of six other bulls. We were warned that a wounded bison can run for miles on adrenaline if being nudged on by a group. We watch as they disappear over the horizon. We drive to where we last saw them and they are nowhere to be found. Randel offers to go tracking them while we drive the high roads glassing. I give him the go ahead to follow the frozen splashes of blood. We are driving from group to group in search of big nasty but no luck for about three hours.

As we drive down into a valley, I see Randel on a ridge pointing down to the far north. I can just see brown tufts sticking up over a ridge. We park and start walking out there. We sneak up on the group of seven and watch them for what seemed like enough time for my hands to freeze and break off (so like maybe 10 mins?). I notice the biggest one limping and then see a spot of blood on his front left shoulder. I give dad the nod and he sends two shots real quick. Big nasty doesn't run more than 200 yards before tipping over. Now he has 6 other bulls kicking at him and all head butting each other. They solve their pecking order adjustments and start to circle wider and wider. I see Randel walking toward us in the open and the bison start getting closer to us. Dad asks if I brought a knife in case things get real bad. I respond, if they cross that close ridge hand me the gun and I start dropping them one by one with or without a tag. Lucky for us I didn't have to test my frozen hand shooting ability.

We walk out to the bison and take a few pics. Normally I would have a whole photo session. Those of you that have been hunting with me know this can take time to do it right. Here, we had no time as it was just a few hours before dark. No way to move a 2000-pound animal, and maybe no way to get it or us back to the truck before we freeze to death. We start cutting into it as if it's going to be our last meal. It's so heavy and we are so cold we can't even lift a leg to cut skin on the underside. Poor Randel was working so hard and sweating. The sweat would hit his glasses and before it could drip off the bottom it would freeze. There are so many pictures I wish I could have taken of the immense amount of work dad and Randel did but my hands were freezing every time I took them off the animal so I just kept to the work. I think Randel grew up like we did. No complaints during work as it's not going to help any, just get it done. We were certainly grateful for that as we hauled loads to the truck throughout the night. Each of us got way too cold at one time or another so we had to prompt the other to get to the truck and warm up then hike back after warming up to get another load. The last load was the head and hide that we estimated to be 250 pounds. Dad and Randel towed it on a piece of plastic all the way back, stopping to rest many times. Once at the truck it took all three of us to get it in the truck as we were all nearly spent. Covered in ice and blood we jumped in the truck and headed to town. I'm not sure such an epic hunt should end with a restaurant meal and warm motel bed, but this one does.

Can't wait till the next one.

You all have asked for a shoot that's not 22lr so here's your chance to bring that hunting gun you have told us that you shot your big game at 1000 yards????

Rules:

1. \$ 20 buy in
2. Any center fire long rifle that's legal to hunt within NV
3. 10 rounds of ammo
4. Eye and ear protection

Event:

All shots on a target at 100 yards

1. 3 shots from the standing position
2. 3 shots from the bench
3. 3 shots from a sitting position
4. 1 shot as a bonus "Bonus shot will be explained at the event"

All shooters must use provided supports by Honcho

"No personal equipment except gun and ammo"

Standing shot can use shooting stick provided at event

Bench shot is off the CCSC bench with bags provided

Sitting shot is with bum on bag on carpet with bags provided for use "no gun on bag"

Ties will be broken with shoot off so bring a few extra rounds.




Second Amendment News



In January 2026, Second Amendment news is dominated by tension between gun rights advocates and the Trump administration following the fatal shooting of Alex Pretti by federal agents in Minneapolis, despite Pretti legally carrying a concealed weapon

The NRA and other groups are demanding a full investigation, opposing administration comments that protesters should not carry guns.

Key January 2026 Pro-Second Amendment Developments:

Internal GOP/Gun Group Conflict: Second Amendment advocates and the NRA are expressing fury over comments from President Trump and federal officials, labeling them "dangerous and wrong" after agents shot a legally armed citizen. Advocates are warning of electoral consequences, with some threatening to sit out the midterms.

SCOTUS Action: The Supreme Court heard oral arguments on January 20, 2026, in *Wolford v. Lopez*, a case challenging a Hawaii law restricting carry on private property open to the public, with indications the conservative majority may strike down the restriction.

DOJ Policy Shift: A new "Second Amendment Rights Section" is being established within the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice to investigate state/local limitations on gun rights.

Restoration of Rights: The DOJ is moving to revive a process for restoring gun rights to certain individuals with felony convictions under 18 U.S.C. § 925(c).

Veteran Gun Rights: [S.478 - Veterans 2nd Amendment Protection Act of 2025](#), introduced earlier, continues to be a focus, aiming to prevent the VA from sending veteran information to the NICS background check system.



Just for Fun




